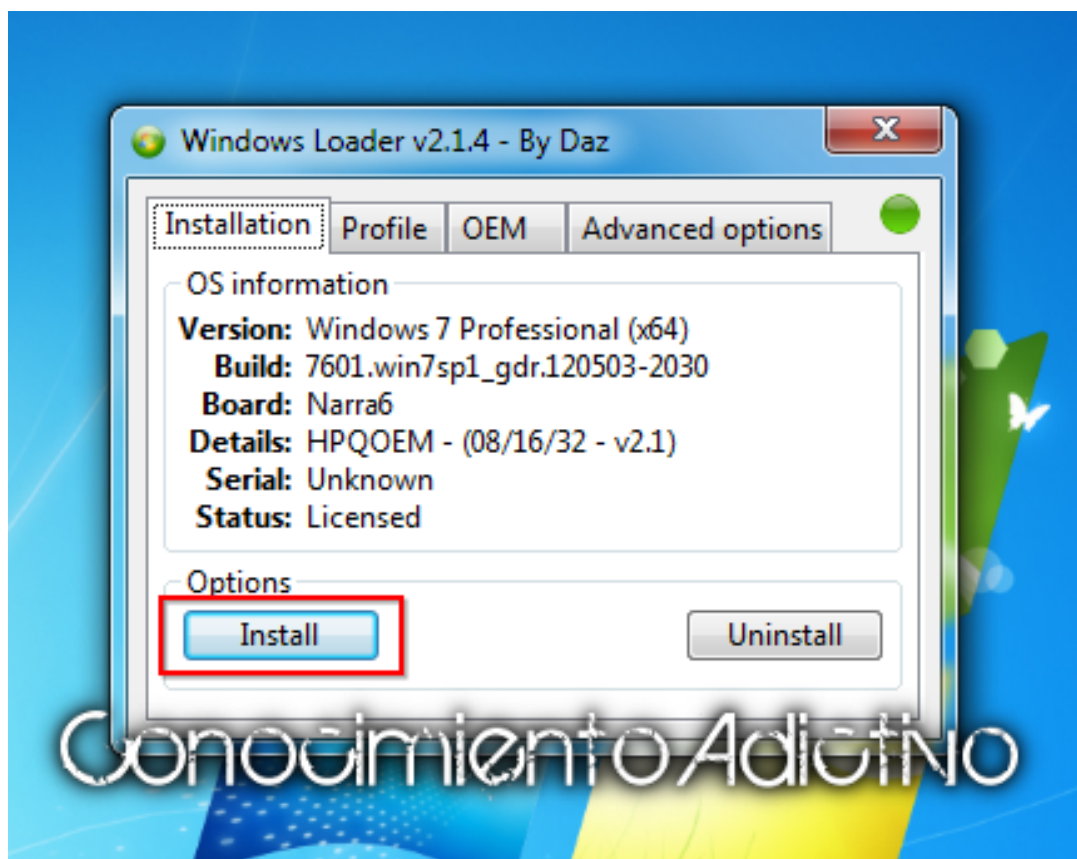

Downtown apartment towers are popping up on Parramatta Road, with the view that they'll create a world-class district and lure more residents and retail into the CBD. ParkPlace Parramatta, due to open in the first half of next year, is among the first of five major developments to break ground across the city this year. The \$1.4 billion Parramatta Square will feature two towers, one on the corner of Parramatta and George streets and the other between Erskine and Macquarie streets. The complex will have 390 apartments in the towers on George and between Macquarie and Erskine streets, and 300 apartments in the Erskine Street tower. Facebook Twitter Google+ Pinterest LinkedIn The corner tower at Parramatta Square will have 22 storeys and will be the tallest building in the city, while the tower on Erskine Street will have 24 storeys. The developer, real estate giant Stockland, says the development is the culmination of 10 years of planning. Land and development experts are calling for a unified front to attract the shopping, residential and business that will help revitalise the entire street. With the buildings' construction expected to start early next year, groups are hoping Parramatta Square will be more than a finished product. "Once that's done, we need to start showing people that there is great potential on Parramatta Road, and there's still things to do," said New South Wales Development Authority executive director Steve Mills. The Government is willing to provide a \$10 million investment in Parramatta Square, which will be a shared benefit fund, but is not planning to fund any of the high-rise buildings. Greens MP Jodi McKay, who represents the area, said Parramatta Square is not the end of the development story. "It's really important we think about the Parramatta Road corridor as a whole, not just about the retail at the end," Ms McKay said. "We need to think about the 82157476af

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
